CURLING ALBERTA HOSTS HIT DRAW TAP CHAMPIONSHIP FOR KIDS

The Hit Draw Tap Provincial Championships presented by Tim Hortons took place in Okotoks after the semi-final of the 2020 Sentinel Storage Alberta Scotties Tournament of Hearts.

The Hit Draw Tap program is a youth skills competition where kids age 6 to 13 compete as individuals. The kids are grouped into three different age categories, 6-8, 9-10 and 11-13 and they perform three different shots – a "Hit," a "Draw," and a "Tap."

Over 450 Participants from across all of Alberta competed at their local clubs with the top five scorers in each age category qualified to compete in the first-ever qualifying Hit Draw Tap Provincial Championship. Fifteen young curlers and their families enjoyed the semifinal game before they got to step onto the same ice

that the best women curlers in Alberta curled on all week. Getting to throw rocks on arena ice was a real hit with the young curlers.

"It just felt awesome — I really wanted to play on arena ice," said 10-year-old Kesler Bachek of the Okotoks Curling Club. "It curled a ton. Not too fast, it was super fun."

Bachek competed in the provincial Hit Draw Tap finals in the 9 to 10 year-old category.

"I loved being out there in front of everybody and curling on the different ice." Bachek said. "I was a little nervous."

TEAM WALKER'S ROAD TO THE 2020 SCOTTIES TOURNAMENT OF HEARTS



Last week, Canada's top women's curling teams faced off at the 2020 Scotties Tournament of Hearts in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan. For newly crowned Alberta champions, Laura Walker, Kate Cameron, Taylor McDonald, and Nadine Scotland, the road to the Scotties was an exciting one.

After a dominating week at the Alberta provincial championships, skip Laura Walker knew going into that final game versus Team Rocque was going to be a tough one. Playing a team three times in one week is a daunting task, especially against one as strong as Kelsey Rocque's, but they kept their mantra the same. Keep focused, stay committed to the process, and do all the little things that brought so much success all season. Having decisively won every game to that point, Laura Walker talked a bit about their mindset going into that final game on Sunday.

"We just wanted to remind ourselves that just because it was the final, it doesn't mean that it should be different," Walker said. "Let's just go in and do the things that got us here." Their strategies and process obviously worked, as the Walker rink defeated Team Rocque 7-4 to represent Alberta at the upcoming Scotties Tournament of Hearts.

Following the Alberta Scotties, Team Walker announced that Kelsey Rocque would be joining them in Moose Jaw as their alternate. As Laura, Taylor and Kelsey were teammates for three years, they know each other fairly well and are quite familiar with each others' game. "Not only do we have a good relationship with her," says Walker, "we know her well enough to know that she's just going to take on that role and do it with 110%. She's that type of person that will do whatever she needs to do and whatever's best for the team, so we're really looking forward to that." Rocque joined the team in Edmonton for a practice session the weekend before the team traveled to Moose Jaw.

It's been quite a journey from a young girl starting out in the Little Rock's program at the Scarboro Golf and Curling club for something to do on Sundays. In a time when many curling clubs frowned on junior curlers participating in their competitive men's and women's leagues, Scarboro's small curling membership gave a resounding yes to letting Walker's up-andcoming team play. "We had the same core group of us going through juniors since I was 6 years old," said Walker. "Had I not had those people there at the club going out every week, I don't know if I would have stuck with the sport and that would have been such a shame now."

The roster for this year's 2020 Scotties Tournament of Hearts was an impressive one, but not many first year teams have come together as quickly or have the chemistry that Team Walker shares. They are 100% supportive of each other and stand united on women being able to do it all – career, family and carving out their place in professional curling. "We're having lots of fun together so we keep that light side to the game has been a big asset for us," said Walker. That fun has included the team keeping a season-long tally of a "pigs" game, which has been quite the lucky charm.

"For me, when I decide to do something, I'm doing it 100%," said Walker. "I knew that once I was in the game, I wasn't going to ever half-ass it, or do it partway. I was going to give everything. It's easy to do that with my teammates and seeing all the work they are putting in too."

Team Walker finished their 2020 Scotties Tournament of Hearts run with a 3 - 4 record, missing the championship round. Congratulations to Laura, Kate, Taylor, Nadine, and Kelsey for making Alberta proud!

ALBERTA CURLING LEGEND FRED STOREY PASSES AWAY


The curling community is mourning the loss of Fred Storey, one of the game's great front end players, at the age of 87.

In an era of corn brooms and 12-end games, Fred's curling career spanned across his high school years, cash spiels and provincial playdowns. With Fred as lead, Calgary-based Team Northcott, went on to win three Brier and World championship titles in 1966, 1968 and 1969. Representing the Calgary Curling Club, Storey earned seven Brier Purple Hearts and was inducted into the Curling Canada Hall of Fame in 1974.

Combined with second Bernie Sparkes, Storey formed one of curling's most awe-inspiring front ends. Warren Hansen, a fellow Hall-of-Farmer and 1974 Brier champion, described how Storey changed the concept of what a lead could provide to a team. "I think Fred was one of the first great leads in the sport," said Hansen. "If there was a corner guard put up, he'd be behind it, buried, above the tee-line, in a split second. That was a lot of the success of the Northcott team. During the 1960s I don't think I can think of a lead who was better at playing that game than he was. In

that time, the lead was the one who set up the end. If your lead was able to get around a corner, you were almost assured of getting a deuce because the runback wasn't a routine shot like it is today."

Thanks to legendary front end players like Fred Storey, the necessity of having a lead that is both strong on the brush and sets the tone for a successful end, is recognized by curling athletes at all levels.



"He provided a lot of the mental strength for that (Northcott) team," said Hansen. "Fred didn't have to say much; it was his actions. He was a no-nonsense guy on the ice; just win, win, win. I'd say he was the best lead in the game in the 1960s; he took the position of lead to another level."

Skip Abby Marks, along with vice-skip Catherine Clifford, second Paige Papley, and lead Jaimie Scott won a 6-4 victory over Team Cinnamon in a tight final game, to be named the 2020 Alberta Junior Women's Champions. "I was very excited to be able to go back to Nationals this year and to make it through that tough provincial field," said Marks. Getting to

be Team Alberta is a privilege and always an amazing opportunity. The experience you get from being able to represent your province at the Canadian Juniors is really special and I'm glad I was able to do it a second time."

Team Jacques entered the playoffs with an undefeated record in the round robin to face Team Libbus. With the game tied after 10 ends, skip Ryan Jacques, backed up by vice-skip Desmond Young, second Andrew Gittis, and lead Gabriel Dyck, maintained their composure under pressure to finish 6-5 to win the Junior Men's Championship in the extra end. "With such a tough field of competition in Alberta, it was a huge honour to win the right to represent Alberta at this year's Canadian Juniors," said Jaques. "The high level of junior play in our home province pushed us to perform our very

best, and made our trip to Langley that much more meaningful."

Team Marks and Team Jacques went on to represent Alberta at the New Holland Canadian Junior Championships on January 18th-26th, in Langley, BC. With a 6-4 record in the round robin, Team Jacques finished just one spot shy of a playoff spot in 4th place overall. At the Junior Awards banquet, Ryan Jacques was awarded the prestigious Ken Watson Male Sportsmanship Award, as voted by his fellow players. Team Marks finished their impressive championship run as Silver Medalists and Catherine Clifford was named as one of the women's All Stars with a shooting percentage of 83%.

Both teams plan to stay together next season to focus on men's/women's and university play.

CALL FOR AWARD NOMINATIONS

Every year Curling Alberta will honour those individuals who make outstanding contributions to the sport we love. There are specific awards to celebrate those coaches, players, volunteers, officials, ice technicians and partners who continue to inspire curlers of all ages and abilities.

We want to recognize these extraordinary people that selflessly give their time and energy tospread the power of sport through curling, from grassroots initiatives up to our high-performance athletes.

Nominations are being accepted for the following awards:

TEAM OF THE YEAR

Awarded annually to a team who is a shining example to others. Considerations include sportsmanship, dedication, positive leadership qualities, and community involvement. All ages, categories, and skill levels are eligible, but competitive achievement will be a highly weighted component. Team accomplishments are limited to Curling Alberta events in the most recently completed season.

COACH OF THE YEAR

Awarded annually to a coach who has directed his or her team with sportsmanship and integrity. This individual possesses proper skills and knowledge to effectively mentor, support, and challenge their athletes while instilling a love of curling. This coach inspires continued learning and improvement, and demonstrates respect and care for athletes. A high standard of personal conduct is also clearly exhibited. The minimum coaching standard to be met by nominees is Club Coach "Trained" or Competition Coach "Trained" as recognized by Curling Alberta and the Coaching Association of Canada.

INSTRUCTOR OF THE YEAR

Awarded annually to an instructor who has been a difference-maker in his or her club and community. He or she has gone above and beyond to build membership, preserve and improve existing programs, and introduce beginners to our sport in a safe and enjoyable manner. This individual has a passion for teaching and has also demonstrated a high standard of personal conduct.

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

Awarded annually to a volunteer who has made an extraordinary contribution to the sport of curling.

CURLERS CORNER YOUTH SPORTSMANSHIP AWARD

Awarded annually to a team or individual athlete who exemplifies the ideals of sportsmanship both on and off the ice with ethical behavior, fair play, respect for others, and a love for curling. The team or player must be eligible to compete in the U15, U18 or U21 categories.



CLUB OF THE YEAR

Awarded annually to a member club or community curling centre which displays outstanding impact in and on the community. Areas of consideration may include: development of innovative programs and services; alignment to the provincial programs (e.g. whole of sport approach); evidence of volunteer management strategies (attract, develop, retain); evidence of financial sustainability / viability; sound leadership practices (role descriptions for committees and key club roles, robust governance practices); community engagement (e.g. with other clubs, schools, sponsors, external stakeholders or community groups); coach and/or instructor development processes in place; retention and growth of a diverse membership; success in fundraising and management of large capital projects; etc. Clubs are encouraged to self-nominate for this award. Only member clubs of Curling Alberta are eligible to be nominated for the Club of the Year award.

PARTNER OF THE YEAR	Awarded annually to a sponsor or partner of curling that has shown tremendous support to the sport.
OFFICIAL OF THE YEAR	Awarded annually to an outstanding official who who has demonstrated a high level of knowledge, strength, leadership, dedication, and integrity.
ICE TECHNICIAN OF THE YEAR	Awarded annually to an ice-maker who has provided significant leadership, excellence, and dedication to their craft.
PRESIDENT'S AWARD	Awarded annually to anyone as selected by the President of Curling Alberta for outstanding service to the sport of curling. Current Board members are not eligible. Nominations for this award will be considered but the recipient is usually self-selected by the President.

Our club was hit with a massive unexpected maintenance issue this year which has delayed our season.

We found with inspection of starting up our club that our chiller was inoperable. Upon further investigation we found that the condenser, compressor, in floor heat, and brine pump also needed to be replaced. With most of our expenses quoted, materials purchased, labour, permits, and building cost we are around the \$80,000 mark. This is devastating information for a small town club but not an unobtainable goal to overcome with the board, members and volunteers of our club.

Our members have donated back their fees (with no curling in site until hopefully next year), volunteered their time to help run events, apply for grants, gather silent auction items, organize raffles, and so much more. They have stood beside the board of the Mayerthorpe Curling Club, done whatever was asked or needed and

even offered up ideas of their own. We are so proud of this club and community. This is the spirit of why we all curl.

This is why we freeze night after night for the thrill of a curling rock on a clean sheet of ice. This is what brings us together, what forms the leagues, and fills the bonspiels. The passion for this sport, the unity and loyalty it brings between some complete strangers that have the same sport in their heart. It helps us go that extra mile to volunteer and see a small club get back on its feet. When we say "this is our house" we truly mean home. Home for many to come, far and wide. To come with skill or not, years of experience or not, but always always welcome. Curling does that. No matter your age, curling is a sport for all.

BRUSH HEADS COMPLIANCE: PROTECTING THE INTEGRITY OF THE SPORT AND THE SPIRIT OF FAIR PLAY

For all competitive play that leads to a national championship or awards CTRS points, each player declares one sweeping device that must be WCF (World Curling Federation) approved. An approved WCF code must appear on the brush head to be compliant. The 2018-22 Curling Canada Rule Book now includes the details of the brush heads and the penalties associated. Refer to Section 11.'SWEEPING"(12)Brush Heads page 45 of the Curling Canada Rule Book. The penalty for using an illegal brush head is the game is forfeited and the player is suspended from the entire competition and cannot be replaced by a spare or substitute.

In fact, the Curling Club Championships have specific rules against elite curlers entering to ensure that the model stays true to the experience only being offered to "club curlers". If nothing else, you'll make new friends that you are likely to see at the next out-of-town bonspiel.
