## TEAM CROSS GOES TO NATIONALS

The initial 5-0 defeat by Team Powell in draw one only fueled Team Cross to win the next six games and land in the 2020 Curling Alberta Mixed Provincial Championship playoffs at the Shamrock Curling Club.

Warren Cross and his team from the Saville Community Sports
Centre (third Erica Wiese, second Cody Bartlett, and lead Ashley Kalk) faced Albert Gerdung and his team from the Brooks Curling Club for a second time of the championship in the gold medal game. Gerdung, eager for a different outcome than the defeat in draw seven, matched the score in the eighth end which forced an extra end. Team Cross held strong to pull away with a 5-4 victory.

### U18'S STRONGLY REPRESENT ALBERTA

Sixteen teams from across the province battled over the four-day Optimist U18 Provincial Championships at the Medicine Hat Curling Club to earn a spot at the national championships. As the host province of the 2019 Canadian Under-18 Boys and Girls Curling Championships, Alberta was given the honor of sending both the girls and boys gold and silver provincial medalists to nationals. Team Wytrychowski and Team Molberg earned the right to be named Team Alberta while Team Bakos and Team Sonnenberg placed second to be named Team Alberta 2 in the girls' and boys' events, respectively. Coming out on top of the consolation event was girls' Team Bakker and boys' Team Kroker.

The U18 teams made Alberta proud by putting pressure on their opponents at the Glen Allan Recreation Complex in Sherwood Park Curling Club at the beginning of April. Both teams on the girls' side entered into the Championship round. Jessica Wytrychowski and team

mates Olivia Jones (vice-skip), Micayla Kooistra (second), Emily Kiist (lead), and coach, Joe Brown won 5 of the 6 games to finish at the top of Pool B before heading into the Championship Round against Ontario. Julia Bakos' Team Alberta 2 (vice-skip, Quinn Prodaniuk, third, second, Kim Bonneau and lead, Julianna MacKenzie and coach Blair Lenton) entered the Championship Round after a 4-2 record in Pool A.

On the boy's side, Team Alberta's Nathan Molberg and team (skip to lead, Ben Helston, Nick Warkman, Morgan Bilassy and coach Nicole Bellamy) topped Pool A with a 5-1 record. Team Alberta 2 (Cortland Sonnenberg, lead, Owen Fenske, third, Jaxon Hiebert, second, Adam Elsenheimer, lead and coach Les Sonnenberg) finished in fifth place in Pool B.

Alberta's own Jaxon Hiebert, second, and Les Sonnenberg, coach, of Team Alberta 2 were recognised at the Awards Ceremony with the Balance Plus Fair Play award. You can find the final results and the podium standings for both the boys and girls on Curling Canada's website.

Earlier in March, Team Molberg and Team Bakos also represented Alberta in the 2019 Canada Winter Games in Red Deer. Team Molbergs' roster was the same as the U18 roster while Team Bakos had a slight roster change with Alyssa Nedohin as second and Glenna Rubin as coach during the Games. Both teams battled hard to make it to the quarterfinals, placing fifth overall. Complete podium results can be found on the Canada Winter Games website.

Eight men's teams and eight women's teams from across the province met on April 10-14 at the Calgary Curling Club to compete for the 2019 Curling Club Provincial Championship title and a trip to nationals.

Nanette Dupont and her team from Lethbridge Curling Club (Samantha Davies, third, Kendra Nakagama, second, and Avice DeKelver, lead) only needed seven ends against North Hill's Vanessa McConnell in the gold medal game to take the title.

The Glencoe Club's Dale Goehring (skip), Chris Armstrong (vice-skip), Fred Edwards (second) and Andrew Brotherhood (lead) took an early lead with four in the third to put the pressure on Graham Powell and his team from Grande Prairie CC. Also, finishing in seven ends, Team The Glencoe Club punched their ticket to Nationals with a 7-3 final.

Team Lethbridge and Team The Glencoe Club will represent Alberta in the 2019 Canadian Curling Club Championships on November 25-30, 2019 here in Leduc, AB. Be sure to keep an eye on Curling Canada's event website for the draw so that you can follow along!

# ALBERTA TEAMS CONTINUE TO SECURE SPOTS ON THE PODIUM



Skip Jack Smart, viceskip Martin Purvis, second Bruno Yizek, lead Anne Hibberd, alternate Wendy Frazier, and coach Bridget Wilson will represent Canada at the 2020 World Wheelchair Curling Championship in Wetzikon, Switzerland, Feb. 29 - Mar. 7, 2020.

### CURLING ALBERTA COORDINATES JUNIOR EVENTS AROUND ALBERTA

As Curling Alberta is dedicated to growing the sport by offering a platform for junior curlers to participate in competitive events, a number of junior events were coordinated around Alberta this past season. These events included the Curler's Corner Bantam (U15) Championship, the Neil Moher Bonspiel, Hazel Jamison Junior Bonspiel, and the Junior Club Championship.

The Curler's Corner Bantam (U15) Championship, hosted by Spray Lakes Curling Club, Cochrane on March 8-10, saw 16 teams compete in a roundrobin pool format for the chance at the championship bracket. Teams qualified for the championship by earning their berth at either the Innisfail qualifier or Okotoks qualifier. For many teams, this was their first competitive experience.

After a strong battle and a close finish in the gold medal game, Team Raniseth was crowned the 2019 champion over Team Wright. Team Plett fell to Team Molnar after an extra end in the bronze medal game.



Please note that the availability of our instructors is generally best early in the season, between September and December.

- Provide access to your club and/or facility for the course free of charge.
- Provide participants with the opportunity to purchase food and beverages at your club (optional).

### CURLING ALBERTA ROLES & RESPONSIBILITIES

- Contract and pay available and certified facilitators to deliver the course.
- Advertise the course (post on website, social media, include in club mailout, etc.).
- Hold overall financial responsibility associated with organizing and operating the course.
- Coordinate all aspects of the course (online registration, fee collection, refunds, etc.) and provide all materials and equipment.
