CLUB OF THE YEAR RECIPIENTS

Shamrock Curling Club CLUB OF THE YEAR

"It's wonderful to receive recognition for all the hard work we put in. The award is a reflection of our membership and our community and honours how we managed our way through these troubled waters together."

It began with twelve people meeting at Hart's Drug Store in January 1955, to discuss forming a curling club. The Shamrock Curling Club in Edmonton officially opened its doors on February 14th, 1956 and has embraced a strong sense of community and comradery ever since.

During the 2020/21 season, the Shamrock Curling Club raised the bar in navigating the challenges presented by the ever-changing landscape COVID-19 presented. At the beginning of the season, their robust and detailed return to play communication established a level of trust and safety for their membership to return confidently back to the ice, with their registrations reaching 90% capacity. Their on-ice mask wear policy paved the way and provided a framework for

both the Edmonton & Area Curling Clubs (EACC) and Curling Alberta's own on-ice mask policies.

Throughout the pandemic, the Shamrock continued to keep their membership informed, connected and engaged with online 50/50 raffles, with monthly jackpots surpassing the \$6,000 mark. With the inevitable forced closure for curling clubs across Alberta, the Shamrock offered their membership the option of a refund or a donation of their dues. Their innovative Shamrock Loyalty Card provided discounts for the upcoming season and a Shamrock loyalty curling pin, which incentivized the donation option. The Shamrock Curling Club received an

overwhelming \$100,000 in donations, reflecting their true sense of community and collective strength, as well as putting them firmly in the black to start next season.

"It highlights the fact that we are

doing something pretty special and good here and it reflects well on our membership," said Chris McTavish, General Manager, "There are a lot of people pulling on the same rope and people are proud to be part of our community."

With its enthusiastic and vibrant membership, the Shamrock Curling Club showcases Alberta's grassroots curling and community spirit and remains a place that brings neighbors together and where life-long connections are made. Curling Alberta is pleased to congratulate the Shamrock Curling Club as a recipient of 2021's Club of the

Sylvan Lake Curling Club CLUB OF THE YEAR

For nearly one hundred years, the Sylvan Lake Curling Club has been throwing rocks down the ice, beginning as a two-sheet natural ice rink and only 32 members. Since opening their doors in 1928, the club has become a focal point not only for local curling enthusiasts, but as a gathering place for community meetings and social functions. Today the club calls the NexSource Centre home, and provides a world-class curling experience, while still maintaining that small-town community vibe. Descendants of the founding members are actively involved in the Sylvan Lake Curling Club and their rich curling history of making their community a better place is evident today.

When Curling Alberta first determined that the combined Men's and Women's Provincial Championship would not be viable in a large arena due to no fans

and COVID-19, they looked to smaller communities. After reaching out to Sean Durkin from the Town of Sylvan Lake and Leslie Hill from the Sylvan Lake Curling Club to see if they would support this initiative, both the



CURLING COMMUNITY HERO

Daryl Huff was the heart and soul of the Leduc Curling Club and even prior to the creation of this award, was considered a highly-regarded curling community hero. He played an integral role in the club's success and leadership, helping curlers safely return to the sport they love during the uncertainties presented by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Each year, the Leduc Curling Club's ice goes in very early and as such, they were in the unique position of being tasked to be the first in Canada to navigate a new reality and new rules for return to play for the 2020/21 season. Daryl spent countless hours in meetings, laying out a safe plan and implementing that plan successfully. He stepped out of his comfort zone, and was interviewed several times by news agencies and curling bloggers throughout the world. He happily became a resource for other

clubs, as they faced the questions of what to do during their reopening plan.

"It was an extremely stressful time and Daryl forged through despite the concern and pressure placed on him," said Dawn Gavin, the President of the Leduc Curling Club. "At every draw, his patience to assist players with checking in and completing the required health forms was unwavering. He diligently oversaw an impeccable contract tracing list, which was never needed as we thankfully didn't have any reported cases. He patrolled the ice, explaining to players where to stand, and how to keep each other safe. His attitude was contagious and the membership embraced the opportunity to play, while staying within the current restrictions."



Thanks largely to Daryl's hard work and guidance, Leduc successfully ran a summer league and moved into fall league that saw curling on the ice for 4 months before the province-wide shut down.

In his nomination of Daryl, Michael Malo, a director at the club, said, "His hard work, dedication to the game and passion for curling cannot be matched. The amount of stress, tears and hard work to keep curling this year during a pandemic was unbelievable. I don't think anyone in the province has the love or passion for the game like he has."

JAMIE OLVER AND THOMAS OLVER

CURLING COMMUNITY HEROS

The Board of Directors at the Banff Curling Club nominated Curling Community Heroes, Jamie and Thomas Olver for their outstanding contribution to the club and community this past season.

As host to the men's ATB Banff Classic in October, the Banff Curling Club aimed to livestream the event so that Alberta's broader curling community could enjoy the live curling action. Unfortunately, the individual who usually managed livestreaming was stuck out of country, and the club looked to their community for assistance. Jamie and Thomas Olver were extremely supportive and not only offered to do camera work on some of the draws, they even helped take over the programming and software set-up for the event.

Spanning over three days, the Olver brothers worked every single draw of the ATB Banff Classic, from early morning

to late at night, to ensure that there was full coverage for the event. When Alberta Health Services restrictions had still not eased a few weeks during the highly anticipated Banff and Canmore junior bonspiel, once again Jamie and Thomas rose to the occasion. They agreed to livestream all the draws which showcased the event and allowed for family and friends to enjoy curling from home or even from the parking lot!

"In these uncertain times, these two individuals stepped up and ensured fans had a chance to see some great curling and that family and friends could support their athletes while not being able to physically fill the stands. The sheer number of hours dedicated to the software work and actual programming, producing and camera work was significant. They never complained and did a fantastic job," said Steven Young, the President of the Banff Curling Club. "To make their

help even more special, the Olver brothers are not curlers, but know members of the club who have always helped them and their family out. When other IT persons in the community were asked to help. they wished to be paid, but Jamie and Thomas helped simply to give back to their community."

After the challenges of this past year, we are fortunate to recognize and celebrate individuals such as Jamie and Thomas Olver, who remind us that community heroes truly do exist and inspire us to work towards making our own communities a better place.

CURLING COMMUNITY HERO

Ron Pelkey was nominated as a Curling Community Hero by his peers on the Board of Directors at the Calgary Curling Club, for his contributions as a participant, an organizer, an administrator, and a volunteer.

As a participant, Ron curls in multiple leagues at multiple clubs in Calgary, from recreational to semi-competitive, giving him a unique perspective at the grassroots level of the sport. Ron encourages and introduces new players to the game, always making them feel welcome and included. He keeps every game fun and embodies the spirit of curling every time he steps on the ice.

As an organizer, Ron has served on the Board of Directors since 2017 and began his term as President during the 2020/21 season. Since joining the board, Ron has modernized the evening leagues

draw spreadsheets, working with staff to improve and increase the efficiency and accuracy of the standings system. He also modernized the club's online practice ice booking system, again leading to a more efficient and cost-effective solution. In his term as president, Ron and the club have faced unprecedented challenges due to the pandemic, yet through it all, his pragmatic approach led the board and guided staff through the decisions that successfully ensured the financial health of the club. Despite a shortened year, Ron's leadership, as well as the generosity of the membership, helped the Calgary Curling Club achieve a balanced budget.

As an administrator, Ron was instrumental in helping the club organize and manage two separate 50/50 fundraising campaigns. These initiatives directly helped members understand the importance of fundraising efforts, and played a significant part in the Calgary Curling Club being recognized as one of the top selling clubs during the 2021 Curling's Capital event series #shareyourlovewiththeclub campaign. Perhaps his most significant contribution as an administrator has not yet been fully realized. The business of curling has changed dramatically, and Ron organized and hosted a series of workshops that includes input from staff, members, and directors and will shape how all aspects of business will be conducted at the Calgary Curling Club going forward.

"As a volunteer no job is too small for Ron," said Rob Lane, board member. "From selling 50/50 tickets to keeping score at the annual Turkey Shoot, or helping with door prizes, Ron does everything possible to make events fun and exciting for our members. From the onset of our COVID protocols, Ron was at our front door helping members stay safe and play within the recommended guidelines. If Ron sees a job that needs to be done, he doesn't hesitate to do it."

In true hero fashion, Ron was surprised and humbled upon learning of his award. "Like so many other businesses in Alberta, the Calgary Curling Club has struggled through the pandemic, but we have been fortunate to have, in addition to our board and staff, a wonderful group of members in our curling community who have generously donated a significant portion of their refunded fees to us and are also answering the call with their time, in a voluntary capacity," said Ron. "From where I sit, the road ahead is paved with uncertainty but I'm confident that together, we will move ahead in this new world with strength and determination as we get back to the sport we all love so much.

The President's Award is an annual recognition given by the President of Curling Alberta to a member of the curling community for outstanding contribution to the sport. The award is not about identifying 'THE' person best suited, but rather 'A' person suited for this award. There are a number of worthy individuals, and my hope is that we will recognize all of them eventually. To date, two individuals have received this award; Rene Sonnenberg and Barb Dickson, both true pillars of the curling community and leaders who have inspired us to be better ourselves.



While possessing strong opinions, he actively listens to other's ideas, in fact he invites it, and is receptive to changing his mind or parts of his conclusions if convinced. Second, he maintains a level-headed, calm nature, and is respectful in his approach and responses. Even when arguing, I have never seen Mike raise his voice or get

overly emotional. Although I have been privy to some drawn out 'Geeeeeeshes' or 'comeeeee onnnnnnnn' or my favorite 'Buuudddyyyyyyy, buuudddyyy, walk with me' amongst his other drawn-out sayings.

Even when making day-to-day decisions to improve his club, Mike looks towards the larger picture of keeping
