They were the top team on the U18 Alberta Junior Tour Team Ranking System (AJTRS) and ranked third in the U20 division.

Regionally, Team Plett was the best U18 team in Alberta during the 2021-22 season. Their high level of performance and commitment to excellence has earned them the honour of being Curling Alberta's Team of the Year.



COACH OF THE YEAR

TIM KRASSMAN

It is with great pleasure that the players and parents of Team Duncan nominated Tim Krassman for his exceptional contributions to the sport of curling as Coach of the Year.

Having won multiple provincial titles and a national title. Tim possesses a clear knowledge of the many facets of the game. His list of accomplishments is impressive, but such a list does not inherently make one a good coach. Through conversations and observations, Tim quickly learned about the boys and demonstrated an investment in them as individuals, both on and off the ice. He respects each curler for who they are, inclusive of all of their strengths and challenges. His personalized feedback is reflective of their unique learning styles and emotional needs, and has helped each one become all-round better athletes.

Throughout the season, Tim worked with the team to set, reflect on, and adapt goals to help the boys reach their potential.

Tim's expectations were clear: 'have fun, be a good teammate, leave it all on the ice'. He viewed each event as a learning opportunity. Going into the U15 provincials, the initial goal was to make the playoffs and Tim didn't hesitate to help them set new goals after each playoff game. To help them achieve both short- and long-term objectives, Tim leveraged the Enhanced Coaching rules and effectively used coaching interactions; he gave immediate feedback when required, but also knew

when to let them make their own decisions in order for them to learn in the long run.

The boys work hard for Tim and each other because he inspires them and their respect for him is undoubted. They were often the last sheet of curlers on the ice at practice. On the rare occasion when Tim's absence from practice was unavoidable, they followed Tim's plans and they conducted themselves as they would if he was there. Given their young age, it might have been tempting for them to lose focus, but they


worked hard because they wanted Tim to know they spent their time wisely.

Tim took four boys, with varied skills, personalities, and experience with competitive curling and led them from underdogs to a U15 provincial title in just five months. His impact on this team is impressive, however, his influence goes beyond Team Duncan's successes. As a volunteer, Tim has helped curlers and coaches in the North Hill U18 Advanced Junior Program and prior to that, the

Medicine Hat Junior Curling Program. The impression he made in Medicine Hat was evidenced by the number of his former curlers who came to cheer on Tim's team at Provincials and were seeking opportunities for photos and advice with their former coach. Three of the top five curlers in this year's qualifying round of the provincial Hit, Draw, Tap competition have also worked with Tim at some point. He shows genuine interest and unwavering commitment to all his players, often watching either in person or via livestream and showing encouragement on social media. Tim's influence extends to coaches as well. Because he is approachable, it is not uncommon to see other coaches look to Tim for advice.

Team Duncan's success as U15 Provincial Champions and winners of the AJCT Player's Championship is a direct result of Tim's coaching. He patiently worked with them to develop their skills in a way that would challenge them but foster a love of the game. A positive role model who exudes kindness, patience, and respect in all he does, he helped shape the boys' personal development including learning how to win and lose with grace. His experience and wisdom have helped him to know when to let the bovs make mistakes and how to learn from them. Although he is Team Duncan's coach. the profound influence he's had on junior curling in Alberta can be felt on a larger scale and will leave an impact for years to come.

Whatever needs to be done, Janessa automatically pitches in. When she volunteers to help, she gives that project much of her time and attention, seeing it through to completion. She has managed the club's lounge, volunteering many hours during bonspiels, league and fun nights. Janessa oversees all league registrations and schedules, as well as maintaining all the club's social media accounts. Her regular posts regarding club events and bonspiels, and updates submitted to the local newspaper, keep the local community engaged and positively promotes the club at many levels.

"Janessa is extremely dedicated to the Grimshaw Curling Club and curling as a sport. She constantly helps around the Club, whether it be in the bar, kitchen or even supporting the ice crew during busy bonspiels. Janessa makes sure to support other local clubs by curling in their events to help promote the sport of curling within our area."

"Without Janessa, the Grimshaw Curling Club would not be open today," said Ben Hill. "She was instrumental in the club's reopening and plays a significant role in the day-to-day operations. I can think of nobody more deserving than Janessa Allan for Curling Alberta's Volunteer of the Year Award."

In 2019, Sherry expressed an interest in pursuing her Level III umpire designation, and has been working on achieving that goal even through the pandemic. After completing the necessary requirements of Deputy and Chief Umpire assignments at Provincial events and receiving positive feedback, Sherry was recommended as a Level III umpire in May this year.

PRESIDENT'S AWARD

JOHN MORRIS

The President's Award defined:

The President's Award is an annual recognition given by the President of Curling Alberta to a member of the curling community for outstanding contribution to the sport. The award is not about identifying 'THE' person best suited, but rather 'A' person suited for this award.

We are fortunate in Alberta to have a number of worthy individuals, and my hope is that we will eventually recognize all of them. Renee Sonnenberg was named the first President's Award recipient in 2019, followed by Barb Dickson and Mike Libbus, each one true pillars of the curling community with remarkable contributions. This year, another name will be added to the list and he is in good company, as they are all the leaders who have inspired us to give more, to do more, and to be more.

As to what constitutes selection for the President's Award, I learned some time ago, those people within your organization who you recognize and put on a pedestal, essentially become your organization's heroes. In other words, they become the face of your organization's identity and reflect what we as an organization believe our best behavior looks like. Guided by this definition, the acceptance of this award places a significant responsibility on the award recipient.

Behavior is defined by how a person acts and exemplifies the values that guide their decision-making. The right selection for the President's Award needs to reflect Curling Alberta's values of Fearless Leadership, Trusted Professionals, Part of a Community, and Excellence by Design.

I am confident you will agree with me that this year's recipient clearly demonstrates each of these values. As a leader in our sport, he has the capacity to translate vision into reality, has excelled at multiple levels and disciplines in the game, and



brings a valued perspective to any conversation. He steps up anytime he is called upon, and champions causes when they need a voice.

Basketball legend Michael Jordan once said, "Some people want it to happen, some wish it would happen, others make it happen." This year's recipient certainly is of the make it happen philosophy, and I am pleased to recognize John Morris as the 2022 President's Award recipient.

John Morris, or 'Johnny Mo' as he is often referred to, is a household name in curling. Often seeming larger than life, he has won provincial, Canadian and world championships both as a junior and an adult, both in the fours and mixed doubles formats. His list of accolades is long and distinguished, from his curling origins in Ontario where he won three consecutive junior provincial championships, followed by back-to-back Canadian and World Junior Championships in 1998 and 1999. John moved to Alberta in 2003, where his career took off playing with legendary skips Kevin Koe and Kevin Martin.

His curling resume speaks volumes about his level of competitive play, leadership, and commitment to excellence: 11 Grand Slam victories; 13 appearances at the Tim Hortons Brier, accumulating three gold and four silver medals; and three world championships, resulting in a gold, silver, and bronze medal. John has represented Canada at three Olympic Winter Games, winning his first gold medal at the 2010 Olympic Games in Vancouver, alongside Kevin Martin, Marc Kennedy and Ben Hebert. He became the first man to win two gold medals in curling when he and teammate Kaitlyn Lawes won the inaugural Mixed Doubles event in PyeongChang.

John has stepped up as a super spare for his country on multiple occasions. One of the most notable times was when he joined forces with the 2014 Brier champions, Pat Simmons' rink, as the first ever Team Canada at the Brier, where the team went on to win the event. After the pandemic forced the cancellation of the 2022 Mixed Doubles Olympic Trials, he again answered the call and joined Rachel Homan as Canada's mixed doubles entry into the Beijing Olympic Games, finishing fifth overall.

As impressive as John's competitive career has been, it is only part of the reason he is receiving this award. When it comes to Mixed Doubles, he knows the way, goes



the way, and shows the way. He has even shared his expertise as a coach in 2021 to support the Australian Mixed Doubles team to their first ever curling appearance at an Olympic Games. John's dedication and pure grit in the championing of mixed doubles over the past four years, is another significant factor in his selection for this award.

The sport of curling has undergone many changes including the number of ends in championships, broom types and fabric, the free guard zones and the adoption of the Skins game format, to name a few. No change, however, has provided such a fundamental shift and opportunity to grow the game, as the introduction of Mixed Doubles.

Mixed doubles provides curling with an exciting new discipline requiring less people and time to play, engages new curlers and countries, exposes more elite curlers in our sport, and yet another opportunity for Canadians to compete in World and Olympic championships. A game once dominated by 'fours,' is now available to 'twos.'

In the twos game, points are there to be had, no lead is safe, and both athletes share equally, but have different roles in the game. It showcases the success of great team dynamics, and never gives a player a shot off.

John did not invent the format, but stood firmly behind it, giving it both exposure and a champion.

After winning the first ever Olympic gold in Mixed Doubles in PyeonChang four years ago, John opted to leave the fours game and focus his energy on Mixed Doubles, not just in Canada, but around the world. He became a de facto Mixed Doubles spokesperson, advocating for events and opportunities that would allow athletes to advance and excel in the discipline.

In 2018, John partnered with the Rocky Mountain Curling Association to create the Qualico Mixed Doubles Classic, jointly hosted by the Banff and Canmore Curling Clubs. This inclusive World Curling Tour event has attracted leading international, Canadian and Alberta teams in competition. John's vision was not only to have the top players play against each other, but to expose international teams to great competition, provide Canadian teams an opportunity to play top quality games, and develop new teams through exposure to the game and elite teams. Ultimately raising the bar for the discipline and challenging others to raise it even higher.

Having spent time with John on the phone, in meetings and listening to him speak. I have come to realize John's opinion and purpose is not selfish. He considers other's ideas and is as eager to see others grow as well as himself. He thrives on challenges and wants to ensure the players have access to great competition, while still having fun and enjoying the game. That is why at his event, the social aspect is as important as the competition. Music is played during games, spectators sit on the ice with the players, and players are provided the opportunity to socialize and have fun with sponsors, volunteers and spectators.

Mixed doubles is a big part of where the game of curling is heading. We are on the cusp of seeing mixed doubles specialists overtake the greatness of two top fours curlers playing the game. John is at the forefront of this key sports development in curling, a trailblazer in this discipline, and an incredible spokesperson for it.

John's continued efforts to bring mixed doubles to the forefront, is paving the way for growth and development in our sport and exciting times ahead. We have only seen the tip of the iceberg so far, and we believe as the future unfolds Mixed Doubles will prove to have a significant role in developing future initiatives, introducing new champions, and inspiring curling's revival.

I listened as John once addressed a junior team. The two points of advice I still remember most from that talk were when John told the group that he has lost more finals than he has won. He continued, "you will lose more than you win. It's putting yourself in the position to win and learning from losing, that enables you to

win sometimes. In a curling event with 16 teams, there are always going to be 15 teams that lose and are disappointed and only 1 that wins". To me it puts winning a curling event into context. Throughout an event, there are so many things that can derail you or cause you to come up just that little bit short even if you are expected to win, or are pound for pound the best team. When you get that win, it is a very big achievement to be celebrated, not expected.

Curling is only one facet of John's busy life, which is filled with a variety of interests and skill sets. He co-authored the book, **Fit to Curl**, is a certified personal trainer, a Holistic nutritionist and a highly trained firefighter in Rocky View County. A gourmet chef, he is also a graduate from the Chef's training program in New York. Recognizing the potential impact he could have and the importance of supporting youth, John has volunteered as a 'Big Brother' in Calgary since 2011 and was even selected by the International Olympic Committee as an Athlete Role Model at the 2020 Youth Olympic Games.

I remember asking John if he wanted to coach some curling clinics in the summer. He politely declined, saying the summer is for family and fishing. He believes in taking time off away from the sport so you can come back to it in the fall ready to excel and enjoy it once again.

Family is the heart and soul of who John is, and his most important role is that of a loving husband and father. Along with his wife Maggie, and two kids Jack and Zoe, John lives in Canmore, Alberta, where they take full advantage of the great outdoors. Spending time with family, listening to vinyl, fishing, and cooking, are his favorite pastimes.


