VIC LEMECHA: CURLING 70 YEARS AND COUNTING



Born in Edmonton and raised in Coleman, Alberta, there was not much to do in winter, other than play hockey or curl. "I wasn't much of a hockey player," said Vic Lemecha, "so I started to curl when I was 14 and have curled on and off ever since."

At 84 years young, Vic is a competitive curler, on the ice at least three days a week at the Canmore Golf & Curling Club and the Banff Curling Club in the Men's and Mixed leagues.

A Civil Engineer by education, Vic earned his degree from the University of Alberta. By trade, his career as a Construction Manager has taken him and his family all over Canada and the United States, where he found a curling home nearly everywhere he went, except for his four years in Honolulu. As a long-time member of the Glencoe Curling Club, Vic maintained his membership during his 20 years in the United States. When his wife tried to convince him to give up his membership, he was adamant that he just wanted to curl at the Glencoe, "one more time." Following their return to Canada in 2013, Vic and his wife moved to Canmore and made the weekly trip into Calgary on Tuesdays so he could curl in the men's league. Vic continued curling at the Glencoe in that same Tuesday league, until he was invited by daughter, Karen, to join her in a mixed league in Canmore.

"When I asked her what night it was and she said Tuesday, I replied that's when I curl at the Glencoe," said Vic. "Between her and my wife, they convinced me to curl with my daughter, instead of at the Glencoe, but I 'm still a member. So, I pay dues at the Glencoe, dues at the Granite Curling Club in Seattle, dues in Banff, and in Canmore."

Through his years of curling, Vic has curled in multiple bonspiels across Canada and the United States. One of his favorite events was the now discontinued Midsummer Bonspiel in Nelson, where over the course of a week, curlers played one game in the morning and golfed in the afternoon, or vice versa. Another favorite is the famous Bunny Bonspiel in Crowsnest Pass, an event he first curled in when he was 15. With almost 70 years of curling under his belt, there have been many special curling memories, from traveling to Switzerland to watch the World Championships, attending the Brier, curling with his daughter, and having his son Colin come and cheer him on in his games in Banff. What about the moments that stand taller than the rest?

"I guess one would be the time we lost the Newfoundland and Labrador Championship to go the Brier. I'll never forget that," said Vic. "Several years later, that same team who beat us, again won the provincial championship, and went on to the Brier. That was a long time ago, way before Gushue."

Another standout occasion was when Vic competed on a team representing the Seattle Granite Curling Club in the USCA National Mixed Curling Championships, held in Two Harbors, Minnesota in 1997.

For almost 70 years, Vic has enjoyed countless hours curling with friends and family, at both competitive and recreational levels. Curling is truly a sport for life, and Vic Lemecha is the archetype of longevity and love for the game. As for what keeps this veteran curler coming back, to the game, to the club, and to the ice, to Vic, it is simple.

"It keeps me active. I ski and I curl. Lately, I shovel snow. What else is there to do in winter?"

The fund was put in place to honor Hec Gervais, a curling legend and his many accomplishments in curling, to his community, his country, and throughout the curling world. Established to reflect Hec's values and beliefs of a strong education, competitiveness and community leadership, this fund is made possible through the cooperation of the governing curling bodies in the Provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan and by the support of curlers everywhere.

The Foundation provides young curlers with the financial opportunity to further expand and refine their curling abilities and accomplishments. This fund is made possible through the cooperation of all the governing curling bodies in the Province of Alberta and friends of curlers everywhere.

Curlers who are a member in good standing with Curling Alberta and 20 years of age or under as of December 31 in the year of application may apply for the scholarships. Curlers who are attending high school or post-secondary education are encouraged to apply. Applications must be received by May 31.



The For the Love of Curling Scholarship Program is intended for young Canadian athletes who excel in curling, maintain a good level of academic standing, and demonstrate a strong commitment to their community through leadership volunteer activities. The purpose is to give talented junior curling student athletes the support to pursue their curling and academic dreams.

It's thanks to the generous support of the curling community across Canada, including the Governor General's Curling Club Members, that we can play this collective role in supporting the next generation of passionate, talented, and caring curlers. Each year, eleven scholarships, one of which is presented by the Governor General's Curling Club, and each valued at \$2,500, are awarded to student curling athletes who have been accepted into a post-secondary education program. The **Sandra Schmirler Foundation** encourages the athletic and academic careers of promising Canadian curlers by offering annual scholarships. Since 2013, the Sandra Schmirler Foundation has awarded \$5,000 scholarships to six youth curlers annually. The scholarship funds education and curling expenses equally. Spirit of Sandra Scholars are mentored throughout the curling season by Olympians and World Champions Lisa Weagle and Brett Gallant. Scholars will be invited to a two-day camp with the Mentors in late summer 2024, where they will learn more about the Foundation's mission, visit a NICU, develop their fundraising activities, and take part in team building activities.

Each Spirit of Sandra Scholar is responsible for organizing a fundraising event to raise funds and awareness to ensure that Sandra's Legacy Lives On. The scholars are provided with the opportunity to select one hospital foundation to receive a grant to purchase life-saving equipment for their Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU).



HEC GERVAIS

ALBERTA SPORTS HALL OF FAME INDUCTION DARWIN DAVIDIUK



Darwin Davidiuk is a dedicated advocate for curling, deeply committed to preserving its rich history. From the 1970s to throughout the 1990s, Darwin served as a board member and President for various curling clubs and associations in Alberta, representing Northern Alberta's curling interests at provincial and national levels.

In addition to his administrative roles, Darwin coached students at Innisfree and McNally High Schools during the 1960s and guided high school Men's and Women's teams across rural Alberta and Edmonton, leading them to compete at Northern Alberta and provincial championships.

Competitively, Darwin excelled in curling until 1990, earning numerous zone berths in Northern Alberta in both high school and Men's competitions. He earned respect from elite curlers and played alongside renowned figures, and Honoured Members, Hector Gervais and Matt Baldwin.

As a founding member and Vice President of the Northern Alberta Curling Championship Society (NACCS), Darwin played a pivotal role in organizing and managing championship curling events, supporting over 100 affiliated curling clubs in the region.

His leadership extended to major curling championships, serving as Vice Chair for Promotions and Sponsorship for several events, including the 1987, 1999, and 2005 Canadian Men's Curling Championships. The 2005 Edmonton Brier set attendance and financial records that stand to this day.

Darwin's efforts were also instrumental in promoting the 2007 Ford Men's World Curling Championship and the 2009 Roar of the Rings – The Olympic Curling, both of which saw record-breaking attendance.

A dedicated historian of curling, Darwin led initiatives to preserve the sport's legacy. He conducted research that documented championship victories and curated stories of curling legends, collaborating with Honoured Member Terry Jones to produce the publication, "World Capital of Curling".

In recognition of his contributions, Darwin was inducted into the Governor General's Curling Club in 2008, an honour reserved for individuals who have made significant contributions to curling across Canada. His passion for the sport and commitment to its legacy continue to inspire generations of curlers.

The Alberta Sports Hall of Fame provides a family-friendly, interactive experience. You will be surprised by what you discover inside! Have fun, laugh, play and discover Alberta sports heroes together. The Alberta Sports Hall of Fame is an interactive, handson celebration of Alberta's sporting history. Our over 7,000 square feet of exhibit space includes a multisport area with virtual baseball, basketball, football, hockey, and soccer, a 200-meter wheelchair challenge, a Treadwall climbing wall, the Orest Korbutt Theatre, Hall of Fame Gallery, and much more. Our museum has over 16,000 artifacts of Alberta sports history in the collection and showcases many of these items in a number of displays. The Alberta Sports Hall of Fame also offers an education program, group activities, and a unique environment to rent for your birthday party, special event, corporate reception or meetings.

SPCC MURAL UNVEILING

A massive mural has been installed inside the Sherwood Park Curling Club (SPCC), located within the Glen Allan Recreation Complex. Designed and painted by local Sherwood Park artist Josh Harnack, the mural will become a one-of-a-kind focal point for the SPCC and a stunning addition to Strathcona County's public art collection.

Heather Nedohin, Business Manager of the SPCC says, "We are beyond excited to showcase this piece of art history with our community. To see the transformation of the GARC wall into a commemorative art display by all involved individuals, is another example of the Sherwood Park Curling Club's commitment to bringing everyone together through a sport for life. The SPCC is proud of curling in our County and this celebration milestone signifies our continued dedication to bringing social and recreation together. The SPCC prides itself to be the heart of GARC and welcomes all to enjoy this rink showpiece vear-round."

Titled "Curling in the County," the mural includes representation of various curling activities, equipment, teams, abilities, and terms. Balancing the curling motif, are visual elements highlighting the diversity within Strathcona County, including local wildlife, flora, and symbols of Canada. As an Act of Reconciliation to our local Indigenous people, the mural includes various symbols important to their community. Woven throughout the mural, are the colors and landscape found in Alberta's coat of arms, culminating in a colorful, playful, and stylized work of art. The images portrayed are ones of curling from the 1960's through to today, showcasing athletes of different ages and abilities.

"I am deeply honored to have been given the opportunity to paint my largest mural to date at the Glen Allan Rec Complex. Growing up in Glen Allan and now having the chance to leave my mark fills me with profound gratitude," said artist Josh Harnack. "It truly feels like a full circle moment. I am immensely blessed to have such an incredible team supporting me, without whom this endeavor wouldn't have been possible. My hope is that the people of Strathcona County will cherish and enjoy this mural for decades to come."

In 2023, the SPCC celebrated 20 years as a curling club and 60 years of curling in Strathcona County. Wanting to memorialize and honor these milestones, long-time Dianne Loesch-Fika and Donna Dosman spearheaded the idea of a mural to be painted on what had been a blank white wall since the Glen Allan Recreation Complex opened 47 years ago.

The mural's unveiling will be the culmination of over two years of work by dedicated SPCC volunteers. With support from the club's Executive Committee, the Government of Alberta Arts, Culture and Status of Women, Strathcona County, generous sponsors, and a fundraising campaign, the project moved from concept to reality in a matter of weeks.

"This mural project has been a dream of mine for several years," said Dianne Loesch-Fika, Project Leader and SPCC Milestone Member. "I'm so excited that Josh has brought it to life! It's going to be hard to concentrate on curling next season."

REMEMBERING CAM HANTIUK: A MENTOR AND A LEGACY

In August of 1996, a pivotal moment occurred in the life of one individual, forever altering their trajectory and igniting a passion that would endure for years to come. This moment was marked by the chance meeting between myself and Cam Hantiuk, a fellow I would consider my mentor and whose influence transcended the professional realm, leaving an indelible mark on the Granite Curling Club, me and the people who were fortunate enough to cross his path.
